#### Second Prize (TEM 694)



# **Farty Gas Ball**



Thanks to what these researchers have dug up, we might have to learn our history all over again!



#### What you need:


DRAWSTRING

- Two big beads (optional)



cloth. Use the pencil to trace a circle around it.




Next, ask your helpful adult to make two holes near either side of the base of the triangle using a hole punch.

Open up the cloth. Take the cord you've got and weave it through the holes as you would a belt. 3


Fold the cloth in half thrice so that you are left with a triangular shaped piece.





Pull the ends of the cord and tie a knot at each of the dangling ends. If you want, you can even weave a bead through each end of the cord before tying the knot.

Now just fill the pouch with your precious trinkets and pull the cords shut






